#### **Conservation Restrictions**

#### **Definition / Scope:**

- Voluntary legal agreements that allow individuals or families to retain ownership of their land, while placing limitations on development and certain uses for themselves and future owners.
- CR's are perpetual and "run with the land" -- it is recorded with the Registry of Deeds and is binding on both the present and future property owners.
- Each CR is tailored and most CR's prohibit development and subdivision, road building, and other uses that would damage the land. Conservation restrictions can allow for certain uses such as woodland management, farming, and recreation.
- Town Enforcers: Local Con Coms, NRC



#### Wetlands Restrictions


- Guide to Farming in Wetland Areas (DEP)
- Definition of wetlands: streams, ponds, bogs, marshes, swamps, floodplains, isolated land subject to flooding, wet meadows, salt ponds, salt marshes, land under the ocean, and fish runs, among others
- Exemptions for established Agricultural Use & Forestry
- Buffer Zones (100 feet)
- Review by local Conservation Commissions.





# Zoning and Local Building Codes

- State zoning laws related to agriculture
- Local zoning bylaws (on-farm sales, agritourism)
- Building Codes (local)
  - road setbacks, lot size, dimensions, signage size and placement, site plan requirements, screening...
